Mary Talks More than Ever Before!

Thanks to an innovative therapist and our supportive donors.

"Through iHear, I've been working with a 7-year-old student, Mary," related Barb Meyers, MA, CED. "She's had a tough road with a late moderate-to-severe bilateral sensorineural hearing loss diagnosis, and she was just recently fit with hearing aids."

Mary's school district reached out to SJI originally to begin iHear sessions to support her listening and spoken language development. We had six sessions this spring and she has steadily progressed ever since. To continue her progress, she required services throughout the summer. Based on Mary's rapid developmental progress through the iHear program, the Director of Special Education of her district approved summer school for Mary.

"To help Mary acquire more vocabulary and language, I developed a word ring for her. The word-ring is a strategy to provide the child a visual picture along with the written word. With practice, the result increased vocabulary. I placed the English word on each vocabulary card, and her Speech Therapist that I work with at

the school district placed the Spanish word alongside, so Mary's family members could practice the vocabulary at home. This tool is a tried-and-true technique our beloved CSJs taught us all those years ago," explained Barb.

"Think about how you communicate. If a child only uses nouns to communicate, like "ball," the conversation comes to a halt. Once you add action words or verbs like "roll, throw, catch, kick, and bounce" with the ball... now that language has power. Look at all the things that a child can talk about now!"

"In our last summer session, we were finishing up and Mary looked straight in the camera. She said, 'Bye guys. See you later!' This is more language and clearer speech than I've heard in our 12 iHear sessions! We were all cheering," recalled Barb, fondly. "I cannot wait to see her progress when we pick back up with sessions in the fall."

Zoey's Story of Growth How Zoey's Family and SJI Changed Her World.



7 oey came to SJI as a 10-month-old child with a bilateral L moderate hearing loss. She had a 6-month delay in her listening and spoken language skills and needed to be fit with amplification," relates Brittany Scott, MA, Teacher of the Deaf. "The family has no prior history of hearing loss, so her parents' learning curve has been sharp and fast. They are completely committed to their daughter's education and quickly picked up LSL strategies from our sessions.

'Initially, Zoey was making some vocalizations but not really talking. Within a few months, her progress really took off thanks to her parents' purposeful actions. She was wearing her hearing aids, putting words together, and making her needs known - sometimes pretty loudly!" laughed Brittany.

Zoey came to SJI at just 10 months old with bilateral moderate hearing loss.

"At 2 years old, Zoey joined the Toddler Classroom Program at St. Joseph," Brittany continued. "This is a great option to really solidify the listening and language lessons learned at home in a group setting with other children."

Zoey's big sister, Matilda, now attends preschool classes at SJI as a peer with typical hearing and receives speech therapy for a mild language delay. According to Brittany, "Zoey is chatty! She puts together 3-4 word sentences, loves to sing and dance, and creates block masterpieces." With a laugh, Brittany continued, "She follows directions as willingly as any 2-year-old will follow directions. I am so thrilled to be a part of this success story for Zoey and her family!"
