St. Joseph's partnership with the Lilly Endowment centers around two primary initiatives. The first aims to enhance technology and data integration. Historically, a lack of comprehensive data about provider efficacy and child outcomes posed a significant challenge to our LSL providers. By establishing the Longitudinal Impact of Listening and Language Yearly Progress (LILLY) database to manage assessment and outcome data, our goal is to remain on the cutting edge of the LSL field and provide the best possible services to our families. Bailey Clay, Director of LSL Advancement, says, "We are excited to implement a new database that will enable datadriven decisions that support student success, demonstrate program efficacy, and highlight LSL development."

The other major initiative will help St. Joseph continue building organizational awareness and capacity. As the only LSL school program in the state of Indiana, families facing a hearing loss diagnosis may never have heard of St. Joseph. By executing new marketing strategies and seeking out media opportunities, we aim to increase organizational visibility and forge new
